Our Success Rates

On average, a 40 year-old has a 1 in 12 chance of conceiving naturally. But this can drop to a 1 in 800 chance as you approach 45. Deteriorating egg quality increases the chance of pregnancy complications and birth defects, so working with the professional and specialist IVF team at Demeter Fertility can ensure you are more in control of your treatment and outcomes.
